The children from Childsplay Homebased Education Service have been enjoying the new foam shapes that the WAVE Resource centre has. It has been amazing to watch how differently they have all been used, and by a variety of ages.

The absolute favourite piece of equipment was the Gymnastic Triangle Soft Shape. It was used to climb up and jump off. It was used to climb up and slide down. The best discovery was that it made an awesome 'horse', that was large enough to carry not only children but supplies too.

Not only did these foam shapes provide opportunities for physical development but the thinking and reasoning and team work that was developing along side that was awesome to watch.

Ti Kōuka Kindergarten

At Ti Kōuka Kindergarten leading up to the Matariki celebrations (late May early June), we spent our WAVE funding to buy timber and soil for three raised garden beds.

Tamariki thoroughly enjoyed participating in transporting timber and also watching the truck come to the Kindergarten entrance and dump the soil. Colin (our handy man), built the gardens with tamariki assistance. We have recently purchased four fruit trees and we had one donated from Nancy (who has since retired from her teaching position at Ti Kōuka Kindergarten). Tamariki thoroughly enjoyed planting the trees with Rachel (teacher) and her father. We found so many worms (a great sign)!

We were thankful to have also been donated vegetable plants from the Corrections Department. Our whānau of Ti Kōuka have also been very giving and we have had numerous families and teachers bring in seeds and plants.

Our vegetable gardens are looking full and children have been caring for the plants on a daily basis – watering and removing shade covers so they can get full sun exposure during the day.

Early in 2014 we received a grant from WAVE to buy some fruit trees to add to our vegetable garden. We sent away for brochures and chose eleven types of heritage fruit trees to plant along the edge of our sport field.

We have a Seckels pear, a Mihi peach, Satsuma, Santa Rosa, Black Doris and George Wilson plums all planted alternately with Tara Road, Wintergold, Rainbow Valley, and Monty's Surprise apples. The Ben Yen lemon is in a big pot on the verandah.

Because we were celebrating the Morven Commonwealth Games, each country planted a tree, so we can report back to the diggers and planters about the growth and harvest when they have left our school.

The games were a great success and we have high hopes that our fruit trees will settle in and perform as well as the New Zealand athletes have done!

Bluestone School students keen to win 'Golden Shoe'

Student council members Emma Kirkwood, Tanya Smith and Jack Rushton are running an Active Transport competition at Bluestone School to see which classes in the Junior and Senior syndicate have the highest percentage of children walking, scootering or biking to school.

They have spray painted two old running shoes gold and mounted them on a wooden plaque to present each fortnight at assemblies. Each class has an 'Active Transport' chart which the teachers complete on a daily basis and the Travel Plan student team collate

results at the end of each week to get an average over the fortnight.

The promotion of active transport has come about after a school travel plan survey was conducted at the end of last year and from that the school community are looking to decrease congestion at the school gate and improve the children's health and well-being by promoting active ways to get to and from school.

Also the installation of the traffic lights at the Church Street and Otupua Road intersection has now made this a much safer crossing point for children on their way to and from school.
